From the English Department

On September 23, members of the NHS English Department participated in a Narrative 4 professional development workshop hosted at the high school. Former NHS English teacher Lee Keylock, who now serves as Director of Global Programs for Narrative 4, facilitated the workshop, which brought together educators from across Connecticut.

Narrative 4 is a global organization that fosters empathy by breaking down barriers and shattering stereotypes through the exchange of stories. Headed by the world's most influential artists, educators, students and community advocates, N4 commits to develop the next generation of empathetic leaders and citizens.

During the workshop, teachers participated in a story exchange and discussed a variety of opportunities and potential models for implementing such an exchange in our classrooms. Teachers were joined by four NHS seniors who participated this past June in N4's Leadership Summit at Yale University. The students offered valuable insights into the benefits of the story exchange both within classrooms and across borders, having participated in several exchanges, including with students

from Chicago and Tampico, Mexico last spring. This fall, several junior English teachers have modeled and incorporated the N4 story exchange in their classrooms as part of their unit on narrative writing.

The department looks forward to sharing best practices with their colleagues across the state as they consider how to build students' understanding of the power of story. Biology Careers

Laboratory Safe Practices


Students in Mr.Tallcouch's Chemistry class investigated safe practices in the chemistry laboratory. Then they worked with a partner to act out (safely, of course) and photograph the opposite of these practices, so-called Lab No-Nos.



The walls around Mr. Tallcouch's classroom were festooned with the results, the Lab No-No posters - a great way to learn what NOT to do in the chemistry laboratory!

Science & Language Connection

Science teacher Trent Harrison visited French teacher Paula Greenfield's AP French class to listen to the students make presentations, in French, on environmental issues. Mr. Harrison, who evidently speaks a bit of French, gave students feedback *en Francais* on the science aspects of their work.



Mrs. Greenfield was most appreciative and afterward wrote the following to Mr. Harrison:

Bonjour Trent,

Merci beaucoup pour etre un membre de la classe aujourd'hui. Thank you for coming to the AP French class as they presented some of the environmental problems facing the earth. You were a welcome addition as you were able to speak to the students in French (after several years away from the language!) and you were able to explain some of the problems and solutions to them in French.

Velocity Lab Activity

Students in Mrs. Torrance's Honors Physics class explored velocity over time using their own movement in a recent lab activity. The lab entailed using one's own body to create position/time graphs and velocity/time graphs, as well as coming up with a series of motions to match speed/velocity time graphs given to them. To do this, students moved at varying speeds and velocities in front of a motion detector attached to a computer program which graphed the data. Students were to sketch the graphs, record the equa-

tion of the trend lines, and list the steps they took to recreate the required graphs. This lab gave students hands on experience with velocity, allowing them to form a better connection between the word and its actual meaning in their minds.



Moving forward in the class, this will be very important, especially in the one-dimensional and two-dimensional motion units, where velocity and acceleration make their way into almost every formula and problem.

Lung Dissections

In September, Mr. Kuroski's Anatomy & Physiology students performed a lung dissection. Fortunately, the lung was no longer attached to its original owner!

Jo Ann Freiberg, PhD., from the State Department of Education, notes that "bully" and "bullying" are out.... "Mean" is a better concept. No one knows

what "bullying" looks, feels, and sounds like; but everyone knows what "mean" looks, feels, and sounds like. So, if it's mean ... intervene. When adults report mean behaviors, they describe the **behavior** – and do not give the **label.**

For students who would like to anonymously report instances of mean/cruel behaviors, "Because I Care..." boxes are located in the Media Center and in the School Counseling Office.

Nutrition News

Chartwells School Dining Services would like to update you on our menu planning strategies for the school year.

Expanded Food Choices

Chartwells remains committed to serving nutritious meals to students in the 2014-15 school year. The following menu planning strategies will be implemented across all Newtown schools:

- An abundance of fresh fruits and vegetables will be made available daily.
- Low-fat white, skim white and skim chocolate milk will be offered daily.
- Flavorful entrees utilizing lean beef, chicken, turkey, low-fat cheese, or beans will be served on a regular basis.
- At least half of the grains offered in the school cafeteria will be whole grain.

For our high school students, we understand their more sophisticated pallets, so we've planned appropriate enhancements to meet their needs. We are very excited to be featuring several new food stations such as a *So Deli delicious!*, *2mato*, *Create Exhibition*, *Grill'd Express*, and a special *Outtakes Quick Serve* station. Be sure to see menus for details on these delicious offerings. Please note that while our \$3.10 complete meal is still available at all of our concept stations, we will also be offering daily a la carte specials that will be priced between \$3.75 and \$6.00 on average.

The Newtown Board of Education has decided to remove the



high school from the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) for the 2014-15 school year. This change will give us more flexibility in food portioning and offerings for our students and reduce food waste. This change will not affect any of the wellness and nutrition initiatives and it will not affect the free and reduced mealtime program for eligible students.

Nutrition Education

Chartwells is pleased to introduce our new *Simply Good* program, a year-long schedule of special events that are intended to encourage students to select complete, well-balanced meals. The Simply Good program continues to have a culinary emphasis that focuses on healthier meal options, especially ones with fruits, vegetables, whole grains and lean proteins. This year's annual Simply Good theme will consist of four main promotions, with many individual promotional events and activities included in each, to build excitement in the cafeteria for elementary, middle and high school students throughout the school year. The Career Center is open from 7:00 am-2:30 pm, Monday through Friday. To schedule an appointment with either Mrs. Ragaini or Mrs. Latowicki, please call 203-426-7679. Mrs. Latowicki has evening appointments, twice a month, until 6:00 pm, **by appointment only**. Please contact us if you require further information on anything written below.

The Career Center is a unique environment that has the resources to provide students with help in exploring their post-high school options and careers. It is located in the rear of the Counseling Office. We are committed to working with students to promote self-discovery through real world experiences. Our goal is to aid students in developing a plan for their future.

The Career Center has up-to-date information on colleges and careers. We have college and career software to assist students with choices for post-graduate plans.

Students can access college, financial aid or career websites during their free periods or after school in the Career Center. (Our computers are also accessible for students to use for schoolwork, during the day, as long as it is during a free period.)

We have current college catalogs, college view books, and college reference books available to students during the day. Our current reference books may not be checked out, but any reference material one year or older may be checked out.



Internships

Junior and senior students work for an employer usually one or more semesters to gain knowledge about a career. Internships occur outside of the school day and may be paid or

unpaid. The deadline to apply for an internship for the current year is December 15. Internships are set up during the school year. Students that complete their internship and required paperwork through the Career Center will have the experience noted on their transcript.

Career Shadows

This program allows juniors and seniors one excused day per semester to spend time in a career field of their interest with a community volunteer. If we do not have a volunteer in a student's particular field of interest, we will attempt to find one. The deadline to apply for a Career Shadow is March 31.

Scholarships

The scholarship list is updated weekly. The scholarship list can be accessed in <u>Naviance</u> under the *College* tab and then scrolling to *Scholarship List* on the bottom of the page.

REMEMBER TO CHECK THE LIST WEEKLY.

A listing of all scholarships can be found in the Career Center, but full descriptions can be found on Naviance. All newly added scholarships will be marked with an asterisk. Most scholarships are for seniors graduating from high school, but there are an occasional few for underclassmen. The more scholarships a student applies for, the more likely they are to receive a monetary award. As the school year moves into the winter months, more local scholarships become available. PLEASE

Also, check the websites of the individual schools for their scholarships. Many colleges/technical schools offer scholarships. Their website will post the requirements to receive a scholarship and if you need to apply for the scholarship or if it is awarded automatically.

Senior De-Stress Day

A date for Senior De-Stress will be announced in November. Senior De-Stress Day will take place sometime in December. The Career Center will host Senior De-Stress Day, a day where seniors only can spend relaxing time, during free periods, and de-stress from the pressures of the college application process.

Quinnipiac University On-Site Decision Day Thursday, November 13

Seniors, if you are considering applying to Quinnipiac University, an admissions representative will be at NHS for an on-site decision day. This means, you will know immediately, after an interview, if you are accepted to Quinnipiac University. Below is the information needed to prepare for this day.

- You must apply online, pay the fee and submit your essay online, by Thursday, November 6.
- You need to submit your original SAT/ACT scores to me by Thursday, November 6.
- Please advise your teacher or counselor to upload their recommendation into Naviance and I will download it and submit it to the rep
 the day of the interview. Remember to give them enough time to write your recommendation.
- I will submit all the necessary documents to the admissions rep the day of the interview: transcript, report card, essay, test scores and 1 recommendation.
- You should have a minimum GPA of 2.8 and a minimum SAT score of 950 for reading and math or a minimum score of 20 on the ACT.
- The criteria for any health science program, excluding PT and PA, is a minimum GPA of 3.3, a minimum SAT score of 1100 for reading and math or a minimum score of 24 on the ACT.
- You may participate in on-site decision day, if you are applying to Nursing and OT. You may not participate in Quinnipiac on site decision day if you are planning on applying to Quinnipiac for their PA or PT program.
- Do not forget to stop by the Career Center to let Mrs. Latowicki know if you are interested in participating in on-site decision day.

Using a Resume to Find a Part-Time Job

A Career or Job Objective sets the tone for your resume and clarifies the type of position you seek. Job Objective usually refers to an interim or relatively temporary role, whereas Career Objective refers to a longer-term position. Listing an objective on a resume for part-time employment is optional.

If the resume is for an advertised position, include the job title in the statement. If the resume is for an unadvertised position, state an area or field of interest. Be careful not to be overly specific; this may eliminate some employment opportunities. Examples:

To secure a customer service position with a dynamic and growing company where there is the opportunity for personal growth and professional development.

To obtain a building maintenance position where my construction experience and strong interpersonal skills may be fully utilized.

Newtown Police Explorers



The Newtown Police Explorers Post is open to high school students aged 14 and above that maintain a "B" average. Students must be able to successfully complete a background investigation, be of good moral character, and never involved in any criminal activity. Students under 18 must have parental approval and be in good standing within the community.

The basic objectives of the Explorer program is character building, leadership development, and to develop an appreciation for community services and good citizenship. The Post also serves as a recruitment tool for students interested in law enforcement, and is part of a community relations effort between the police, youth, and community.
